- 1. I do not have to think about the message my wardrobe sends about my sexual availability.
- 2. I have never been expected to change my name upon marriage or questioned if I don't change my name.
- 3. I am never asked to speak for all the people of my racial group.
- 4. When I use credit cards or checks for a face-to-face transaction, I don't have to wonder whether someone will challenge my financial reliability because of my race.
- 5. I have never been taunted, teased, socially ostracized, or had my job qualifications questioned due to a disability.
- 6. I can do well in challenging situation without being told what an inspiration I am.
- 7. When I apply for jobs, my legal right to work in this country probably will not be questioned.
- 8. People generally assume that I can communicate proficiently in English.
- 9. I have never been told not to speak in my native language during everyday interactions.
- 10. I had/have/expect to have the freedom to choose my partner and formalize the relationship legally through marriage and receive the benefits that accompany marriage, should I choose to.
- 11. I can assume that I will not have to work or go to school on my religious holidays.
- 12. I can be sure to hear music on the radio and watch specials on television that celebrate the holidays of my religion.
- 13. I am reasonably sure that I or my family will not have to skip meals because we cannot afford to eat.

- 15. I can go for months without me or anyone else referring explicitly to my sexuality.
- 16. I There are some parts of my identity I conceal when I enter professional workspaces.
- 17. I have never been asked to prove lineal descent for my racial or ethnic identity to be accepted.
- 18. A parent/relative never talked to me about how to behave if I am stopped by a police officer.
- 19. When people refer to me, they do not mention my race, gender, sexuality, etc.
